

Building Fluency In Reading- Fluency Passages



- The National Reading Panel (NRP) defined fluency as the ability to read orally with sufficient accuracy and speed, plus appropriate expression and identified fluency as one of the five essential components of reading instruction
- Fluent readers are better able to comprehend because they process information quickly
- Fluency provides a bridge between word recognition and comprehension.
- A fluent reader doesn't have to stop and "decode" each word. Rather, most of the words can be read automatically.

How You Can Support at Home- Fluency Passages

How To Administer

Administer a one-minute reading, starting the stopwatch when the student begins the first word of the passage (student will not read titles). Tell the student that if she or he has trouble (struggling for more than 3 to 5 seconds), you will say the word so she or he can keep reading. After one minute, say "Stop," stop the stopwatch, and circle the last word read.

How To Score

 Count the total words the student reads in one minute using the words-per-line totals listed in the margin. This is the student's words-per-minute reading rate. Mark this on the chart at the bottom, along with the date of the reading.
Count the number of errors (slashes). Record the number in the "errors" box under 1 if this is the first reading, 2 if it is the second reading, and so on.

3. Subtract the number of errors from the total number of words read to find the number of correct words read.

4. Divide the number of correct words by the total words read and multiply this result by 100. This is the student's accuracy percentage.

5. Record this number in the box.

Math Fluency- Building Fluency with Math Facts

- *K5 Learning* defines math facts fluency as the ability to recall the basic facts in all four operations accurately, quickly and effortlessly.
- When students achieve automaticity (fluency) with math facts, they have attained a level of mastery that allows them to remember the answer without conscious effort or attention.
- Math facts are important because they form the building blocks for higher-level math concepts



Math Fluency- Multiplication Cover-Up

Materials: multiplication game card for each player, something to cover the squares on card; like pennies, and factor cards

Directions:

1. Choose one player to be the "caller".

2. The "caller" will place the factor cards face down, then turn one over at a time and call out the multiplication expression. (the two factors on the card)

3. If a player has the product of the expression on their grid, they cover it.

4. The first player to cover 5 in a row, column, or diagonally wins the game.
